#### Peer Navigator / Post-Crisis Discharge

- Peer supports in primary care and during transitions including discharge from psychiatric hospitals and crisis residential facilities to assist with community re-integration.
- Partnership with John George Psychiatric Hospital

#### In-Home Outreach Teams

- Home or community-based support and education to consumers and their families
- IHOTs in all parts of the County including TAY-focused Team
- Proposal deadline was April 7. Awards scheduled for July 2016.

#### Community Conservatorship Pilot

- Conservatorship, medication and case-management.
- Pilot program with five clients

#### Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT)

- Court-ordered treatment for consumers who meet specific criteria
- Pilot program with twelve clients






