and end up purchasing inexpensive and unhealthy food and go long stretches without food. Alameda County serves								
approximately 96,000 residents per month through the CalFresh program, 42 percent of them being children.								
However, many children that are eligible for CalFresh are not receiving assistance. AB 1377 will bring key stakeholders								
together to find solutions and increase enrollment for children and their families.								
Potential Impacts to County Implementation of Programs or County Operations:								
No direct impacts to County process and operations in short term. However, depending on recommendations that								
come out of the report to the Legislature, expect there may be changes to systems and procedures in application								
process in the long term in order to accommodate multiple programs.
