

## City of Hayward Child Care Profile

### Families and Children

The City of Hayward had approximately 28,300 children aged 12 and younger in 2000, accounting for just over 20 percent of the City's total population which is larger than most of the other cities profiled. Hayward has a significantly higher proportion of Hispanic or Latino children (46 percent) than the county overall. It follows that the second most common primary language spoken at home for children aged five through 17 is Spanish, at 34 percent, compared to 18 percent county-wide. English is spoken at home in only 50 percent of Hayward families with children ages five through 17. Over eight percent of children in Hayward live below the poverty level, similar to the county-wide nine percent.

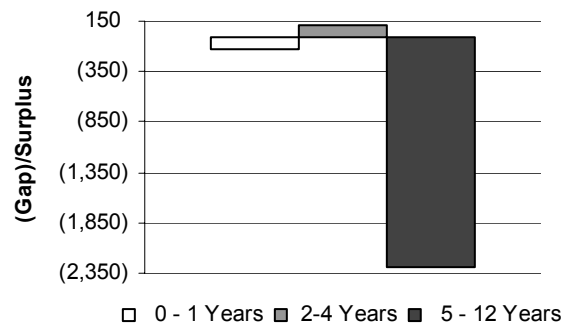
Hayward children have similar rates of workforce participation among their parents as Alameda County children overall. Approximately 58 percent of Hayward children under six are in households with two working parents or a working single parent compared to 55 percent county-wide. Approximately 61 percent of Hayward children six to 17 are in households with two working parents or a single working parent compared to 63 percent county-wide.

### Child Care Demand and Supply

Children in Hayward demand child care at a similar rate to the county. Hayward parents of children aged two to four years demand family child care or center-based care similar to families county-wide. Approximately 51 percent of children two to four demand center-based or family child care compared to 52 percent county-wide. Fifty-eight percent of the city's child care supply is for preschool-aged children, resulting in a surplus of 112 slots. While almost 30 percent of Hayward's child care supply serves school-aged children, the city faces a significant gap of almost 2,300 slots for this age cohort.

These estimates of the supply of school-age care do not include a number of license-exempt facilities such as 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC), After School Education and Safety (ASES) Programs, programs operated by the public libraries and some programs operated by city departments of parks and recreation. ASES and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC serve 1,300 school-age children in the Hayward Unified School District.

### Special Populations

Similar to the county as a whole, 8.3 percent of school-age children residing in Hayward Unified School District are enrolled in special education. Hayward Unified School District is one of seven districts in the county with a Migrant Education Program. That program has identified 193 preschoolers (ages two through four) from migrant families. Only 38 percent of the three- and four-year olds are enrolled in a preschool program, leaving a significant portion unserved. Additionally, there are 437 school-age children (five to 12 years) from migrant families in Hayward Unified Schools. Over 40 percent of school-age children in Hayward Unified School District are English Learners (EL), meaning that their family speaks a primary language other than English at home, and they are not yet considered to have the requisite English skills to succeed in the school's regular instructional programs. This is considerably higher than the county-wide EL rate of 27 percent.
