

2017 Legislation for Children, Youth, and Families

October 15 was the last day for Governor Jerry Brown to sign bills for the 2017 Legislative session. A number of the newly signed bills relate to children, youth, and families and may have an impact on our Alameda County children and youth population, including:



Healthy

Physical Health
 AB 1316 expands the definition of lead poisioning

AB 10 requires public schools serving low-income students to provide free feminine hygiene products in grades 6-12.

• Mental Health

AB 340 expands screenings for children impacted by trauma and adds the provision to include screening for trauma in the ESDPT program.

AB 1340 educating physicians in early identification of mental health issues and exposure to trauma in children and young adults and their appropriate care and treatment.

Nutrition

AB 214 improves access to the Cal-Fresh program for low-income college students.

SB 250 ends school meal shaming for students with outstanding lunch balances.

SB 138 enables the automatic enrollment of students into school meal programs through Medi-Cal Direct Certification and enusres high-poverty schools make free breakfast and lunch available to all students.



• <u>Child Welfare</u>

SB 213 bars homes with adults who have been convicted of violent felonies from being a liscensed foster care provider or certified resource family and prohibits placement of a child in unliscensed or uncertified home.

- Housing/Homelessnes
 Governor Brown signed a
 number of bills relating to
 housing, many of which will
 have impacts of children and
 youth, including: AB 1521
 (maitence of affodability
 restrictions on expiring
 affordable rental properties),
 AB 1598 (allows cities and
 counties to create affordable
 housing authoritiy), and SB 2
 (Building Homes and Jobs Act)
- Juvenile Justice
 SB 190 abolishes
 administrateive fees for
 juveniles under home

SB 438 supports permanent, stable homes for juvenile court dependents

Immigration

SB 54 limits local law enforcement communication with immigration authorities and prevenat officers from questioning and holding people on immigration violations

AB 699 prohibits schools from collecting information about immigration status and ensures educational equity for all students regardless of immigration status.



Thriving

• Child/Family Poverty

AB 1520 establishes the
statewide Lifting Children and
Families Out of Poverty Task
Force (AB 1520)

AB 480 provides diapers for Cal-WORKs families.

Education

AB 19 Community College Promise: ensures 1 year of tuition-free enrollment.

AB 1124 ensures that students in juvenile court schools receive diplomas if eligible and/or are provided the opportunity to re-enroll in their home school and take advantage of other educational opportunities.

AB 1604 Permits a CalWORKs recipient to partcipate in a high school equivalency program prior to other activities.

Early Care and Education
 AB 435 Alameda County Pilot cleanup bill expands elegibility to include alternative payment programs in the pilot.

AB 273 adds enrollment in ESL classes as a criteria for elegibility for subsidized early care and education program participation

AB 752 prohibits expulstion from state-funded ECE programs without proper attempt to maintain safe participation.

SB 63 Ensures at least 12 weeks of unpaid parental
