**Oakland CA – (February 26, 2019)** – On Tuesday, February 26, the Alameda County Board of Supervisors recognized March as Art IS Education Month and April as Arts, Culture and Creativity Month. Board President Richard Valle presented the proclamation. At the event, Supervisor Valle was joined by the other four members of the Alameda County Board of Supervisors; Melissa Wilk, Alameda County Auditor-Controller; Cindy Chadwick, Alameda County Librarian; Rachel Osajima, Alameda County Arts Commission Director and appointed members of the Alameda County Arts Commission; and Dr. Matt Wayne, Hayward Unified School District Superintendent and school district representatives.

“I am pleased to recognize Art IS Education Month of March and Arts, Culture and Creativity Month of April,” said Board President Richard Valle. “These initiatives encourage Alameda County community members of all ages to connect with each other, create solutions, and build community through the arts.”

Alameda County's Art IS Education Month marks its 19<sup>th</sup> year anniversary of advancing all art forms as an essential part of a high quality and equitable education that ensures every student reaches their maximum potential. Art IS Education was founded in 2000 by the Alameda County Arts Commission and the Alameda

County Office of Education, and this is the 9<sup>th</sup> year that the Alameda County Library has joined the partnership to present free arts events to more than 140,000 community members at eleven Library locations across the County. These events include a wide range of workshops, performances, concerts, movies, art contests, exhibitions, and storytime activities for all ages. Arts, Culture and Creativity Month is the 1<sup>st</sup> annual statewide advocacy event that recognizes the crucial role of arts, culture and creativity in the lives of everyone in California. This month long event is being organized by Californians for the Arts. Community members and arts organizations throughout the State are participating.
