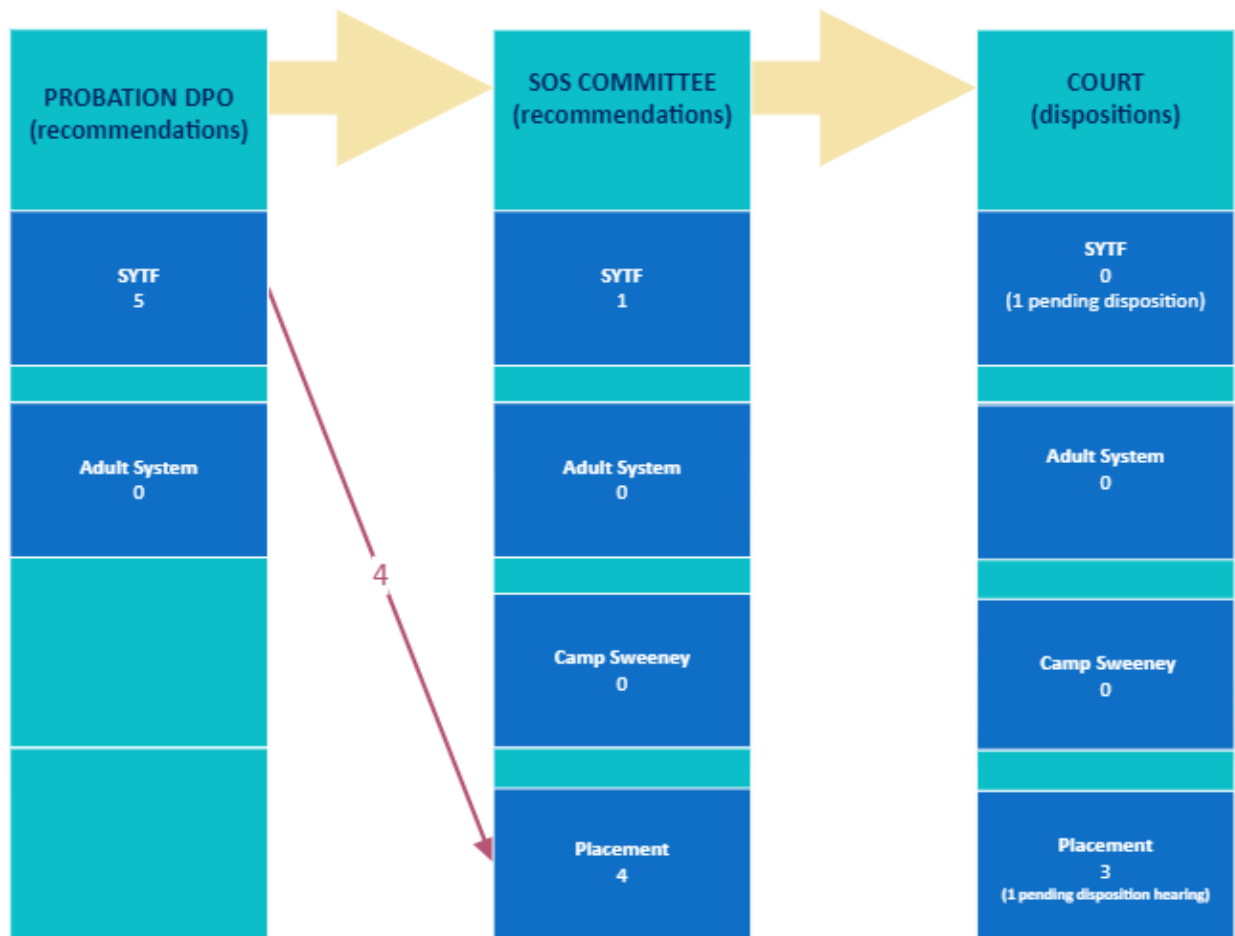

In 2022 Q2, 5 youth were screened for potential commitment to the SYTF by Probation. Of those 5 youth, the SOS Committee recommended 1 of them for SYTF and 4 for out-of-home placement. Three youth dispositions were placement and 2 are pending disposition hearings.
