Alameda County Justice Restoration Project

The Alameda County Justice Restoration Project (ACJRP) is a collaborative program designed to reduce recidivism in Alameda County through innovative interventions. ACJRP is a Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) grant funded Pay for Success project with the goal of reducing recidivism among those with a high risk of recidivating and convicted of a realigned offense. Individuals are referred to ACJRP by the Court. Those who want to enroll and plead will receive a deferred entry of judgement, with a dismissal date instead of a sentencing date.

Eligibility Criteria for the Program

- Individuals who have previously been convicted of at least one low level felony (including a juvenile finding) and who are currently pleading to a new low level felony; and/or
- Individuals with a DA felony probation violation petition based on a new crime; and
- Men and women age 18-34, with a priority for those between the ages of 18-24.

Eligibility Disqualifications

- Individuals living outside Alameda County;
- Individuals with a more serious pending charge, PC 290 registrant, a pending extradition/removal order or federal hold.

Supervision

Individuals enrolled in ACIRP will be identified as:

- Persons convicted of a realigned offense/Not Supervised by ACPD;
- Persons Supervised by ACPD as Services as Needed or Banked;
- Persons Actively Supervised by a Deputy Probation Officer. (For Actively Supervised Clients, DPOs and ACJRP case managers shall work collaboratively to ensure client service delivery.)

AB109 Services

ACJRP clients are entitled to all AB109 funded services and programs, such as Education, Employment, Mentoring, Client Engagement, Housing, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Counseling.
