- 4. Report from agencies collecting data related to housing:
 - a. Sheriff Sergeant Murphy, Reentry and Support Unit (formerly Reentry Services)
 - i. Reception Center now live
 - 1. New reentry process proactive v. reactive approach to reentry
 - 2. Facilities
 - a. Improved greatly from prior facility
 - b. Recounting of success stories
 - i. No uses of force
 - ii. Person who had overdosed was provided life-saving treatment
 - 3. All persons go through Reception Center
 - 4. Secondary screening process
 - a. Housing
 - i. Assessment addresses need for housing
 - ii. Asked if assistance with housing is needed, not whether a person is currently housed or unhoused.
 - b. Other issues addressed:
 - i. Job training
 - ii. Employment
 - iii. Case management

- iv. Substance abuse counseling
- v. Education
- vi. Family reunification
- vii. Violence prevention
- c. Goal is to get the person "pointed in the right direction"
- d. 10-12 questions answered
- e. Information kept in Excel spreadsheet
- f. Within first 10-12 hours
- 5. Persons are connected with CBOs based on answers provided
- 6. Can still get referred through re-entry services desk by individual request
- 7. Only those who are not cite-released are being assessed
 - a. Distinction between "cite-releases" and "keepers"
 - b. Approximately 60% of persons are cite-released without assessment
 - i. Usually 8-12 hours
 - ii. Resources available at SRJ lobby or through the Roots Trailer at Santa Rita
 - c. "Keepers" are the 40% remaining
 - d. Approximately 60% of "keepers" currently are being assessed through Reception Center
 - i. Goal is 80% of "keepers" being assessed
 - ii. Those not able to be assessed through reception center are assess in an individual basis
 - iii. Difficultly tracking persons being released directly from court after intake through the Reception Center
 - iv. Current data from Sheriff includes persons arrested for felonies and misdemeanors
 - e. Built in "redundant steps" to make sure everyone is assessed
- 8. Not collecting any data on how the need is being met internal referral system to make sure person gets a referral to the services the person thinks they need
 - a. Additional info from CBOs:
 - i. Is person referred following through with referral
 - ii. What services are actually being provided by the various CBOs
- 9. Not a risk/needs assessment
- 10. Most persons assessed only are at SRJ for 2-3 days.
- ii. Reentry fair
 - 1. Job fair planned for later in 2023, date no set yet
- iii. Sheriff initiated survey to inmates
 - 1. Information will be included in the Sheriff's transition plan
 - 2. Findings scheduled to be made public later in May
- b. Public Defender info not available
