QUESTIONS & RESPONSES

How are IEP accommodations implemented in a locked facility?

ACOE can provide all necessary services, but they may look different than a traditional classroom.

How many special education teachers are at Juvenile Hall school right now?

Three teachers that are credentialed in special education. There are also additional teachers and paraeducators.

Does the law provide an exemption for the differences in special education from what would occur at a traditional school?

A 30-day change of placement IEP meeting takes place for each new student. Because every school environment is different, not all accommodations are relevant. The IEP team determines what the services will look like.

How many youth in the facilities have IEPs?

There are 22 youth with IEPs at JJC and Camp Sweeney combined.

How quickly does ACOE assess the student after they come in?

The process starts immediately. Records are requested right away. Services can begin as soon as records are received. The records are transferred electronically by the school.

How long does it take to receive the records?

It's up to the district. Ideally, within a week. The information is distributed to the teachers and paraprofessionals as soon as it's received. The 30-day IEP meeting is scheduled as quickly as possible.

At what point are the parents brought in?

Parents are included in meetings.

Are you on time with 30-day and 60-day meetings and assessments?

Yes. Only a few students have out of date IEPs. This can happen when a student is not enrolled at the time of detention. ACOE begins the process of updating the IEPs.

Students are sometimes resistant to being assessed, which can also cause an out-of-date IEP.

How are you able to provide the level of service when you don't have a special ed teacher in every unit?

If we have a student with a need that we cannot assist, we contract out to provide that service.

Our teachers have frequent check-ins with the students and our teacher use trauma-informed principals to address the educational and social-emotional needs of the students.

Are you sharing the IEP findings with Probation staff and/or Behavioral Health?

Information is shared at weekly care coordination Monday meetings and MDT meetings. We do not widely distribute IEP records. The coordinated care team also provides relevant information on an as-needed basis.

Does the information trickle down to the JIOs?

Probation will work to better communicate youth's needs to JIOs.

Does ACOE share specifics with line staff?

ACOE has to be careful with confidentiality and release of information. Parents have to sign off to have IEP information released. Could let staff know youth's needs and triggers, but the IEP document would not be useful.

ACOE stopped sharing IEPs with JIOs due to privacy rules. Looking for proper ways to release information to the JIOs.

Court believes IEP should not be provided to JIOs as they are not trained to interpret them. ACOE can provide information regarding the youth's needs so that the JIOs have a better understanding about how to work with the youth. Court would like to have separate meetings outside of JJDPC to have these discussions. Focus should be on kids who are in JJC for over 60 days.

- Working on an agreement between ACBH and ACOE on how to share information

How can you include the youth's voice in their IEP and education?

ACOE asks for students' input during assessments. They work to design a plan that works for the students and their families.

How is education is happening at Juvenile Hall? Is it inperson? How are the changes communicated to parents?

The education has been in-person for about a year. Some meetings are still held remotely.

Information is communicated through the IEP meetings and psychologists or special education teacher meeting directly with parents. General information is provided to parents by facilities.

Is ACOE providing compensatory services?

We are working to address the learning loss that happened during the pandemic by hiring additional teachers, substitutes, and paraeducators.

We mostly communicate with parents on a one-on-one basis, but we can improve the relaying general information.

What are the ways education will open up to incorporate youth's feedback?

There's an established Youth Advisory Council that is comprised of youth in custody.
