II. Presentations:

College and Career Program Under Development, Kelly Sorbera, ACOE

- 1. This program is designed for the postgraduate youths housed in the JJC to provide life-changing, individualized programming to all students that fully integrates educational opportunities, career development, mental and behavioral health, and social-emotional needs.
- 2. The mission of the program is to fully realize the intent of an Individual Rehabilitation Plan (IRP).

- o This plan must meet individual youth needs.

- o This plan must support youth post release.
- 3. Plans for program implementation are as follows.
 - By the fall of 2024, ACOE will work with ACPD to develop and manage a master schedule for Camp Sweeney and Unit 1.
 - o By the fall of 2024, ACOE will work with ACPD to collaborate on schedules for Units 5 and 6 to give them the opportunity to participate in programming.
 - o By the spring of 2025, ACOE will work with ACPD to develop and manage a master schedule for Unit 5.

Footsteps2Brilliance, Gregory A. Spencer PhD

- 1. A child's solid foundation begins at home and in the community, not in school. Footsteps2Brilliance empowers parents to be their child's first and most impactful teacher.
- 2. 66% of students that cannot read or socially function by the 3rd grade may wind up in prison or on public assistance for life.
- 3. The Footsteps2Brilliance curriculum is pre-K through 12th grade. Both student and parent(s) are able to use and learn from the curriculum.
- 4. Footsteps2Brilliance provides elementary school bilingual literacy, reading, writing, math, STEM, social-emotional learning and more. The software is free to all residents in participating counties. The software is accessible on any smart device 24/7.
 - O It is more than just another literacy program. The program focuses on comprehension, vocabulary, phonics, fluency, alphabet, spelling, writing, reading skills, early math skills, STEM and digital literacy, social studies, physical science, technology competency, character development, common core & standards aligned, real time data with instant feedback, formative assessments & reporting tools, and more.

- 1. General Updates **Yasmin Burke**
 - a. In December, a youth graduated from Laney College and received his AA degree.

- b. On 12/27/23, we held the winter festival which was well attended and supported by our collaborative partners.
- c. The Public Defender's Office provided the youth with pizza on Christmas Day.
- d. The District Attorney's Office provided the youth with pizza on New Year's Day.
- e. The New Year's holiday brunch was well attended.
- 2. Demographics Juvenile Hall

Number of youths in Juvenile Hall -27; 23 are male and 4 are female.

- a. GPS 25 are male and 2 are female.
 - Education 4 are in High School and 9 are in college.
- 3. Demographics Secure Track

Number of youths on Secure Track – 12

4. Camp Sweeny

Number of youths in Camp -12

- a. 7 youth on Secure Track.
- b. 5 Non-Secure Track youths.
- c. 3 youth are attending college in-person.
- 5. One youth
- 6. Programming
 - a. In February, the youth will celebrate Black History Month at Camp.
 - b. Also in February, the public nurse will come to camp to assist with health education such as physical health, diet, exercise, and chronic disease prevention.
 - c. Hidden Genius began the 10-week program on 11/29/23. This is an introduction to coding course which is a prerequisite to Last Mile.
 - d. CTWI construction program is wrapping up the 6-week program at Juvenile Hall.

Medical, Dr. Christine Gerchow

- 1. Beginning January 1, 2024, minors ages 16 and older in California can now consent for Buprenorphine to treat Opioid Use Disorder.
- 2. Medical numbers for December 2023
 - a. 164 RN encounters for a total of 336 visits
 - b. 81 physician encounters; 22 history and physical visits
 - c. 14 optometry encounters.
 - d. 27 dental encounters.

Guidance Clinic, Dr. Christine Gerchow

- 1. We have completed the Secure Track Health Services Manual. Per the youths' request, it is in question format.
- 2. Behavioral Health numbers for December 2023
 - a. 158 encounters
 - b. 7 after-hours crises
 - c. 36 intakes
 - d. 80 referrals

Social Services, Melissa Fegurgur

- 1. In December 2023, there were 58 intakes in the Assessment Center (AC).
 - a. 11 were overstays.
 - b. The average length of stay was 51 hours.
 - c. 85% were females and 15% were males.
 - d. There were 8 duplicate youth at the AC.

2. The Assessment Center is further along in the approval process for the new AC locations. They will be moving into homes providing a home-like serene environment. The youth capacity will be 10.
