


#### Youth Screened for Out of Home Services – Q1 2022

In Q1 2022, 7 youth were recommended for commitment to the SYTF by Probation, and 1 youth was recommended to transfer to the adult system. Of those 8 youth, the SOS Committee recommended 5 of them for SYTF, 2 for Camp Sweeney, and 1 to transfer to the adult system. Five of the youth were committed to SYTF by the court as of May 18, 2022, 1 youth disposition was Camp Sweeney, and 2 are pending adult transfer hearings.
