Levine Act — Campaign Contributions (Government Code Section 84308). As of January 1, 2023, the Levine Act (Government Code Section 84308) applies to Board of Directors proceedings involving a license, permit, or other entitlement for use. Board agenda items that may be subject to the Levine Act are marked with the notation "(***) following the description item.

Pursuant to Government Code Section 84308, no Board member shall accept, solicit, or direct a contribution of more than \$250 from any party or their agent, or from any participant or their agent, while a proceeding involving a license, permit, or other entitlement for use is pending before the County or for 12 months after a final decision is rendered in that proceeding. Any Board member who has received a contribution of more than \$250 within the preceding 12 months from a party or their agent, or from a participant or their agent, shall disclose that fact on the record of the proceeding and shall not make, participate in making, or in any way attempt to use their official position to influence the decision.

Pursuant to Government Code Section 84308(d), any party to a covered proceeding before the Board is required, and any participant to such a proceeding is strongly urged, to disclose on the record of the proceeding any contribution, including aggregated contributions of more than \$250 made within the proceeding 12 months by them or their agent to any Board member. The disclosure must include the name of the party or participant and any other person making the contribution, if any; the name of the recipient; the amount of the contribution; and the date the contribution was made. The disclosure shall occur in the manner required by Government Code Section 84308 and any applicable state or local regulations, opinions, or policies. No party or their agent, and no participant or their agent, shall make a contribution of more than \$250 to any Board member during the proceeding or for 12 months after a final decision is rendered in that proceeding.

The foregoing statements regarding the Levine Act do not constitute legal advice, and parties and participants are urged to consult with their own legal counsel regarding the requirements of the law.

RESOLUTION NO. 2023-

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS FOR THE PERIOD BEGINNING FEBRUARY 23, 2023

WHEREAS, the Ralph M. Brown Act (Gov. Code sections 54950 *et seq.*), requires the meetings of local legislative bodies to be open to the public; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the Board of Directors of the Alameda County Lead Poisoning Prevention Program Joint Powers Authority ("the Board of Directors") and its committees or subcommittees that are subject to the Brown Act are open to the public; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act allows meetings by teleconference, provided specified requirements are met; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency declaring a state of emergency exists in California due to the threat of COVID-19, pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act (Government Code section 8625), which has not yet been lifted; and

WHEREAS, the Governor, toward the beginning of the state of emergency, issued executive orders suspending certain requirements of the Brown Act regarding teleconferencing; the Governor's suspension of Brown Act teleconferencing requirements expired on September 30, 2021, pursuant to Executive Order N-08-21; and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021, the Governor signed into law AB 361, which amended the Brown Act to allow teleconferenced meetings under abbreviated teleconference procedures during a state of emergency (Gov. Code section 54953(e)); and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 54953(e), provides for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), during a state of emergency declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, if certain conditions exist; and

WHEREAS, the conditions of Government Code section 54953(e) are that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or in the alternative, the legislative body holds a meeting to determine, or has already determined, by a majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the Division of Occupational Safety and Health of California's (Cal/OSHA) issued Emergency Temporary Standards that require employers to train and instruct employees that the use of social distancing helps combat the spread of COVID-19 (8 Cal. Code Regs. 3205(c)(5)(D).); and

WHEREAS, on September 28, 2021, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Alameda accepted the recommendation of the Health Care Services Agency Director for continued social distancing at all meetings of the full Board of Supervisors and at all Board of Supervisors Committee meetings; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- Section 1. All of the above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.
- Section 2. The Board of Directors finds that state and local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing. The Board of Directors has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency and finds that state and local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.
- Section 3. The Board of Directors finds that as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees. The Board of Directors has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency and finds that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person.
- Section 4. The Board of Directors therefore determines that it and its legislative bodies shall conduct their meetings by teleconferencing in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e).
- Section 5. This Resolution expires thirty (30) days after the date of its adoption only to the extent required by law. Otherwise, this Resolution shall remain in effect until repealed by the Board of Directors.

Board tabled item #4 and continued to item #5.

4) Brown Act Compliance: Limited Options for Remote Meetings

County Counsel Andrew J. Massey informed the JPA Board of limited options for remote meetings and Brown Act compliance after February 28, 2023.

Mr. Massey reminded staff that AB 361 enabled the JPA Board to meet remotely and excluding the public from attending the meetings in person. That ability will go away when the emergency declaration will be rescinded at the end of February 2023.

The new law, AB 2449, has limited impact and is intended to be used for emergency purposes allowing a member of the legislative body who intends to attend an in person meeting to appear remotely due to unforeseen circumstances that prevents them from attending in person. AB 2449 is limited to two times in a 12-month period and disclosure for not attending the in-person meeting is required.

A quorum of the legislative body must be present within the JPA's jurisdiction if each JPA Director prefers to use their own location for the meeting. Additionally, all locations need to be noticed, agenda must be posted at each of the locations, each location must be publicly accessible, ADA compliant and within the boundaries of the JPA. Mr. Massey noted administrative requirements for tracking the number of times the authority has used AB 2449 and having sufficient administrative staff facilitating the meetings at each of the locations.

Director John J. Bauters asked Directors to contact Ms. Lidice De La Fuente for the Just Cause exemption and to provide advance notification to accommodate for any consolidation or rescheduling of meetings. He reminded Directors that starting in March 2023, the JPA Board will reconvene in-person meetings at Emeryville City Hall at 9:30 a.m.

Board continued onto item #6.

5) Director's Report

Secretary to the Board, Larry Brooks, announced that Lisa Plourde, Senior Registered Environmental Health Specialist is retiring after 29 years of service with Alameda County. Directors and staff thanked Ms. Plourde for her service.

Mr. Brooks announced that Alameda County Board of Supervisor Nate Miley plans on joining the JPA Board to represent Alameda County.

The Department invited Emery High and United for Success Academy/Frontline Catalyst students to apply for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Region 9 Environmental Youth and Teachers Award. Applications were due January 11, 2023.

California Association of Code Enforcement Officers (CACEO) and Regional Asthma Management & Prevention (RAMP) are promoting the restoration of code enforcement incentive grants to assist local code enforcement agencies achieve their goals and are looking for a legislative champion to lead it. Grant funds will assist code enforcement agencies with purchasing much needed supplies and equipment to further their goal.

Lastly, Mr. Brooks announced he will serve as speaker at the Equity Challenges of Housing Code Enforcement webinar on January 31, 2023, at 11AM hosted by ChangeLab Solutions.

PUBLIC OUTREACH

Objective 1: By June 30, 2023, an estimated 5,000 Alameda County residents will be reached through multiple community outeach events and informed of CSA property owner services, lead safety, childhood lead poisoning prevention, training, maintaining a lead-safe property, minor home repair and the impact of housing on health. An estimated 1,625 individuals were reached through virtual collaboration meetings, presentations and trainings during July 1, 2022-December 31, 2022.

Objective 2: By June 30, 2023, an estimated 1,000,000 Alameda County residents will be reached through social media platforms, newspapers, radio, tv, emails, literature distribution and informed of CSA property owner services, lead safety, childhood lead poisoning prevention, training, maintaining a lead safe property, minor home repair and the impact of housing on health. Over 70,000 individuals were reached during the first six months of the fiscal period through mailings, literature racks and website visitors.

Participate in live and/or virtual outreach events, collaboration meetings, presentations and health fairs.

- Staff participated in 35 collaboration meetings, five community fairs and eight presentations.
- In October 2022, during National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week the Department hosted Ask Us, lead in soil and mold workshops.
- Presentations on Department services were made to the Berkeley Tobacco Control program and Berkeley Library.
- The Department partnered with Oakland Housing Authority on the Department's Roadmap to a Healthy Home. A community engagement tool (flyer) to provide residents with information and resources to keep themselves and their family healthy in their housing.

Provide information, technical assistance and referrals to the public through phone calls, emails, responses via social media platforms.

- Staff responded to approximately 500 phone calls from the public. Responses to emails and via social media platforms is an ongoing activity. In collaboration with CA-DPH medical consultant conduct live and/or virtual presentations to medical providers.
 - No activity during this period.

Distribute DIY lead safe paint supply kits in partnership with local hardware stores.

• Two tabling events were held during this period at Laurel Ace Hardware to promote the lead safe paint supply kit program. 15 CSA property owners received kits.

Provide technical consultations to CSA property owners/rental property owners or designed on souces of lead.

• Phone consultations to CSA property owners is an ongoing activity. In person consultations are expected to begin in March 2023.

Collaborate with Alameda County First Five to distribute lead safety educational materials in newborn kit packets.

Develop and implement four multi-media campaigns educating the public and encouraging engagement in lead prevention measures.

• Two media campaigns (radio, online) were conducted during National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week. Radio announcements on KTSF 26, iHeart Radio, Bonneville; Univision Radio. Online campaign on Oaklandside and Berkeleyside.

Implement activites in the CSA in response to results from CSA focus groups.

• In the summer of 2022, the Department held four one-hour paid online focus groups for County Service Area owners of pre-1978 residential structures. The Department learned that CSA property owners and rental property owners want education and awareness, home consultations, lead testing and financial assistance for lead abatement and other housing issues particularly asbestos and mold. In response the Department began updating the website and making information available in different platforms (online workshops, website, social media).

Distribute program services brochures in permit offices, hardware stores, paint stores, and venues visited by homeowners and landords.

• Program services brochures were distributed at Laurel Ace Hardware in Oakland and Alameda County Mortgage Assistance Program.

Participate in regional Head Start Health Advisory Board live and/or virtual meetings to promote lead screening.

• No activity during this period.

Maintain partnerships with rental industry organizations such as EBRHA, Apartment Owners Association and Property Managers Association and establish new contacts with real estate companies and homeowner associations to increase their knowledge of impact of substandard housing on health.

• In October 2022 the Department participated in the East Bay Rental Housing Association 15th Annual Trade Expo. Develop and publish newsletters, articles, email blasts, blogs and podcasts and YouTube on a variety of healthy housing topics and promoting program services.





Report for January 2023 Public Outreach


By June 30, 2023, Alameda County residents will be reached and informed of CSA property owner services, lead safety, childhood lead poisoning prevention, training, maintaining a lead-safe property, minor home repair and the impact of housing on health. Direct outreach to an estimated 5,000 residents will be done through community events such as presentations, information booths, trainings, and lead consultations, etc. An estimated 1 million individuals will be reached through multi-media campaigns (radio, T.V., social and print), collaboration meetings, mailings, webpage, etc.





Healthy Housing Assessments/Interventions

By June 30, 2023, a total of 514 healthy housing assessments / interventions will be conducted in the homes of Alameda County residents participating in the Lead Hazard Control Program, Lead Poisoning Prevention Program, Minor Home Repair programs, Fixing to Stay and Independent Living Homes Project or when responding to unsafe renovation condition complaints.
