RESOLUTION NO. 2022-____

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS
FOR THE PERIOD BEGINNING MARCH 24TH, 2022

WHEREAS, the Ralph M. Brown Act (Gov. Code sections 54950 *et seq.*), requires the meetings of local legislative bodies to be open to the public; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the Board of Directors of the Alameda County Lead Poisoning Prevention Program Joint Powers Authority (“the Board of Directors”) and its committees or subcommittees that are subject to the Brown Act are open to the public; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act allows meetings by teleconference, provided specified requirements are met; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency declaring a state of emergency exists in California due to the threat of COVID-19, pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act (Government Code section 8625), which has not yet been lifted; and

WHEREAS, the Governor, toward the beginning of the state of emergency, issued executive orders suspending certain requirements of the Brown Act regarding teleconferencing; the Governor’s suspension of Brown Act teleconferencing requirements expired on September 30, 2021, pursuant to Executive Order N-08-21; and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021, the Governor signed into law AB 361, which amended the Brown Act to allow teleconferenced meetings under abbreviated teleconference procedures during a state of emergency (Gov. Code section 54953(e)); and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 54953(e), provides for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), during a state of emergency declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, if certain conditions exist; and

WHEREAS, the conditions of Government Code section 54953(e) are that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or in the alternative, the legislative body holds a meeting to determine, or has already determined, by a majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the Division of Occupational Safety and Health of California’s (Cal/OSHA) issued Emergency Temporary Standards that require employers to train and instruct employees that the use of social distancing helps combat the spread of COVID-19 (8 Cal. Code Regs. 3205(c)(5)(D).); and

WHEREAS, on September 28, 2021, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Alameda accepted the recommendation of the Health Care Services Agency Director for continued social distancing at all meetings of the full Board of Supervisors and at all Board of Supervisors Committee meetings; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

Section 1. All of the above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. The Board of Directors finds that state and local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing. The Board of Directors has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency and finds that state and local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

Section 3. The Board of Directors finds that as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees. The Board of Directors has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency and finds that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person.

Section 4. The Board of Directors therefore determines that it and its legislative bodies shall conduct their meetings by teleconferencing in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e).

Section 5. This Resolution expires thirty (30) days after the date of its adoption only to the extent required by law. Otherwise, this Resolution shall remain in effect until repealed by the Board of Directors.

6) **Director's Report**

Assistant Deputy Director for Housing Services, Dale Hagen, informed the Board that Secretary Larry Brooks is not in attendance due to appearing on a national panel addressing diversity in code enforcement.

Mr. Hagen stated the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Renovation, Repair and Painting (RRP) training accreditation was submitted noting that the reviewing process could take six months. The Department will be providing a lead safety training based on the curriculum to participants in the 16-week construction training provided by the Cypress Mandela Training Center.

Channel 7's segment on Cypress Mandela Pre-Apprenticeship Beginning in Construction Training Program is a strong support and framework for the Department to provide lead safety training to their construction trainees. One of trainees that appeared in the segment, Beatrice Andong, was the only trainee to score 100% on her certification exam in the class that she took. A shareable link is available upon request.

Furthermore, EPA is proposing a change to the RRP rule that is expected to increase responsibilities for property management companies. EPA is proposing to withdraw guidance that provide broad exemptions for property management companies treating them more as owner representatives. EPA will evaluate property managers to see whether they fall under the RRP guidelines on a case-by-case basis. The Department staff is working with the East Bay Rental Housing Association to provide information about this change to property managers/owners and will doing a presentation. A version of that presentation will be on the Department's website.

Lastly, students from Life Academy High School supported by non-profit Frontline Catalyst conducted a presentation on January 12, 2022 at Peralta Hacienda Park on Fruitvale's Lead in Soil Community Testing. The students will do a presentation to staff at the Department's staff meeting and have expressed interest in presenting to the JPA Board.

7) **Mid-Year Budget Report FY 21/22**

Assistant Deputy Director, April Williamson, reported on the revenue and expenses for the Department's mid-year budget FY 21/22. Ms. Williamson noted challenges in recruitment for the Lead Hazard Control Grant stating that 31% has been drawdown for the year. As a result, the Department has started aggressive recruitment strategies to bring in additional units and is hopeful that it will make more headway. Contracts for minor home repair services were signed late in November and December 2021 by City of Union City and City of Oakland. Department staff expects to spend most of those funds by June 2022. Lastly, Supplemental Funding is the Lead Settlement funds reflecting zero revenue. The County Board of Supervisors recently approved the distribution of funds on February 1, 2022.

Ms. Williamson noted that the discretionary and non-discretionary expenses will be charged by the end of the fiscal year and is hopeful that the Department will be able to catch up and spend the Lead Hazard Control grant funds. In response to Director Bauters question about concerns of underperforming grants Ms. Williamson stated the Lead Hazard Control grant is not a concern this year since it's a multi-year grant ending in 2023.

Director Gallo stated he is excited to have students from Life Academy do a presentation on their lead study to the JPA Board on March 24th, 2022. 



Public Outreach

Direct outreach to an estimated 5,000 residents will be done through community events such as presentations, information booths, trainings, collaboration meetings and phone consultations, etc. An estimated 1 million individuals will be reached through website, social media, mailings, literature drops, and articles, etc.
