#### MISSION STATEMENT

Our mission is to advance an integrated approach for safe and healthy housing, through collaborative community initiatives, applied research and policy development in order to improve the lives of vulnerable populations.

#### We do this by:

- Promoting lead safety.
- Providing case management to lead poisoned children.
- Providing technical consultations, training and education to the public, property owners and renovators.
- Researching and demonstrating effective programs to address the environmental determinants of health.
- Working in community and stakeholders collaborations to leverage existing resources.
- Developing infrastructures and promoting system change to provide coordinated, cost effective support for healthy housing.

#### ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

The Alameda County Healthy Homes Department's (ACHHD) primary goal is to create safe and healthy housing by promoting an integration and nexus between housing and public health policy. The Department also works to shape an environment that sustains long-term healthy housing conditions to improve health outcomes in Alameda County; it does this by providing case management, public education, outreach, training, housing assessments and interventions, influencing relevant housing policies and regulations, applied research, building cross-sector alliances and workforce development.

The Department's proactive healthy homes strategy is the incorporation of a lead visual assessment on all homes where staff is conducting a site visit, regardless of reason for the initial port of entry. This strategy is a proactive primary prevention approach that increases the number of homes where a lead assessment is done.

The Department provides the services above through funding by the local County Service Area (CSA) service charge for owners of pre-1978 properties in Alameda, Berkeley, Emeryville and Oakland, the California Department of Public Health (DPH), the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Housing, contracts and agreements for minor home repair, Whole Person Care (AC3) and others such as local Measure A funds.

### **SUMMARY OF MAJOR CHANGES**

The proposed goals and objectives for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 include community interaction promoting CSA property owner services, lead safety, childhood lead poisoning prevention, training, minor home repair and the impact of housing on health. The Department will continue proactive healthy housing assessments and interventions with a lead focus.

For FY 2019/2020, the Department secured three-year funding for the Fixing to Stay Project and Independent Living Homes Project funded by Whole Person Care (AC3) and local Measure A. The Fixing to Stay Project, is a partnership with Public Health Nursing to improve the lives of older adults living in-homes in need of minor repairs and/or accessibility modifications by applying a holistic

multi-sector care approach that will promote healthy aging in place, prevent injuries and reduce emergency visits. The Independent Living Homes Project consists of responding to existing complaints proactively by conducting targeted site visit assessments, providing technical assistance and advisement to group home facility operators.

The Department was selected by the City of Union City to administer their minor home repair program. Contract negotiations for minor home repair with City of Oakland are expected to be finalized in Summer of 2019.

Moreover, the Department also intends to apply for the next round of HUD Lead Hazard Control funding, when Notice of Funding Availability is expected to be released in Summer of 2019. The current Lead Hazard Control Program ends its period of performance on October 31, 2019.

The County will provide the Department with financial support to maintain current operations and infrastructure, which have been under funded and understaffed. Lastly, in anticipation of the pending lead paint judgment the Department will seek County funding to assist in the development of capacity of the Department to administer and implement the lead remediation program.

### GOALS AND OBJECTIVES FY 2019-2020

#### **Public Outreach**

Goal: The public will become aware of lead prevention measures and the importance of healthy housing.

#### **Objectives:**

1) By June 30, 2020, an estimated 5,500 Alameda County residents will be reached directly through multiple community outreach events and informed of CSA property owner services, lead safety, childhood lead poisoning prevention, training, maintaining a lead-safe property, minor home repair and the impact of housing on health.

1.1) By June 30, 2020, an estimated 250,000 Alameda County residents will be reached through mailings, email blasts, literature distribution and various media outlets and informed of CSA property owner services, lead safety, childhood lead poisoning prevention, training, maintaining a lead-safe property, minor home repair and the impact of housing on health

#### **Activities:**

#### Community Outreach Interaction:

- Participate in outreach events, presentations and health fairs reaching Alameda County residents, CSA property owners, rental property owners, property managers and single-family owner-occupants.
- Provide information, technical assistance and referrals to callers.
- Maintain partnerships with rental industry organizations such as EBRHA, Apartment Owners Association and Property Managers Association to increase their knowledge of the impact substandard housing has on health.
- Participate in regional Head Start Health Advisory Board meetings to promote lead screening.
- In collaboration with CA-DPH medical consultant conduct presentations to medical providers.

#### Other Interaction:

- Distribute program services brochures in CSA permit offices, hardware stores, paint stores, and venues visited by homeowners and landlords.
- Conduct mailings/e-mail blasts promoting CSA services, lead hazard control assistance, minor home repair, training, and health and safety.
- Partner with Alameda County Bond Insurance for contractor outreach.
- Write and publish articles on a variety of healthy homes topics.
- Increase online visibility by maintaining




#### **Public Outreach**

By June 30, 2019, Alameda County residents will be reached and informed of CSA property owner services, lead safety, lead regulations, childhood lead poisoning prevention, maintaining a lead-safe property, the impact of housing on health and other Department services. Direct outreach to 3,560 residents will be done through community events such as presentations, information booths, trainings, collaboration meetings and phone consultations, etc. Two hundred thousand individuals will be reached through website, social media, mailings, literature drops, and articles, etc.



#### Healthy Housing Assessments/Interventions

By June 30, 2019, a total of 470 healthy housing assessments / interventions will be conducted in the homes of Alameda County residents participating in the Lead Hazard Control Program, Lead Poisoning Prevention Program, Minor Home Repair, and Independent Living Homes Project or when responding to unsafe renovation condition complaints.
