MISSION STATEMENT

Our mission is to advance an integrated approach for safe and healthy housing, through collaborative community initiatives, applied research and policy development in order to improve the lives of vulnerable populations.

We do this by:

- Promoting lead safety.
- Providing case management to lead poisoned children.
- Providing technical consultations, training and education to the public, property owners and renovators.
- Researching and demonstrating effective programs to address the environmental determinants of health.
- Working in community and stakeholders collaborations to leverage existing resources.
- Developing infrastructures and promoting system change to provide coordinated, cost effective support for healthy housing.

ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

The Alameda County Healthy Homes Department's (ACHHD) primary goal is to create safe and healthy housing by promoting an integration and nexus between housing and public health policy. The Department also works to shape an environment that sustains long-term healthy housing conditions to improve health outcomes in Alameda County; it does this by providing case management, public education, outreach, training, housing assessments and interventions, influencing relevant housing policies and regulations, applied research, building cross-sector alliances and workforce development.

The Department provides the services above through funding by the local County Service Area (CSA) service charge for owners of pre-1978 properties in Alameda, Berkeley, Emeryville and Oakland, the California Department of Public Health (DPH), the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Housing, Community Development Block Grants and local Measure A funds.

SUMMARY OF MAJOR CHANGES

The proposed goals and objectives for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 include the continuation of proactive healthy housing assessments and interventions with a lead focus. The Department's proactive healthy homes strategy is the incorporation of a lead visual assessment on all homes where staff is conducting a site visit, regardless of reason for the initial port of entry. This strategy is a proactive primary prevention approach that increases the number of homes where a lead assessment is done.

The Department will continue the Alameda County Asthma Pay for Success Project, a partnership with the Alameda County Health Care Services Agency, U.C. Berkeley and Third Sector Capital Partners. The ACHHD and the Public Health Department's Asthma Start Program jointly implemented the Asthma Pay for Success Pilot project in Alameda County that focuses on validating the efficacy of health and housing interventions in relation to cost savings.

Currently, the Department is in negotiations for extending the Group Living Facilities Project and the Fixing to Stay Project.

In collaboration with the Alameda County Strike Team the Department implemented the Group Living Facilities Project in the unincorporated area of Alameda County. The plan of approach consists of responding to existing complaints of Group Living Facilities by conducing site visit assessments, providing technical assistance and advisement to facility operators.

The Fixing to Stay Project, is a partnership with Public Health Nursing to improve the lives of older adults living in substandard housing by applying a holistic multi-sector care approach that will promote healthy aging in place, prevent injuries and reduce emergency visits.

If agreed upon, the Department will conduct 100 Healthy Housing Assessments and 80 technical advisement plans in the homes of low-income adults age 60 years and older under the Fixing to Stay Project; 30 Healthy Housing Assessments and 25 Interventions under the Group Living Facilities Project.

2) Director's Report

Mr. Brooks informed the Board that the City of Fresno recently passed a proactive rental inspection program that will require inspections covering a basic list of State health and safety standards. Director Desley Brooks stated she assumes that Oakland's proactive rental inspection program will move forward to the Oakland City Council.

Mr. Brooks briefed the Directors on the National League of Cities, City Level Models to Advance Healthy Housing: Lessons from NLC's Mayors' Institute on Housing, Hazards and Health, a summary of creative solutions to improve healthy housing efforts by municipal governments. Mr. Brooks stated he would share the report with the Board.

The Department was recently nominated for HUD's 2017 Healthy Homes Hero Award by HUD Healthy Homes Representative - Regions IX & X, Karen Griego.

Department staff followed up with County Counsel on the Board's authority to take action on policy issues concluding that under Article IV, Powers, of the Joint Exercise Powers Agreement the JPA has the power common to the members to accomplish the purposes of the Agreement, to develop policies and programs to implement the Program and to do all acts necessary for the exercise of its powers. County Counsel recommended that the letters of support include some discussion that links the bills to the powers and activities of the JPA for the Lead Program.

1) Open Forum

2) Director's Report

Larry Brooks informed the Board that the March 22, 2017 Reuter's report, *Dozens of California Towns have Childhood Lead Poisoning Rates Higher than Flint's*, showed that lead exposure is common in the East Bay areas including parts in Oakland, Emeryville and Fremont. This article prompted City of Fremont officials to contact the Department for collaboration opportunities around an outreach campaign alerting residents of their risks for lead hazards. Director Desley Brooks noted that previous outreach campaigns seemed not effective in reaching the community. Directors Susan Wengraf and Mary Hastuma Vella requested a list of lead tainted products be shared with the JPA Board.

Director Susan Wengraf provided a status update on the City of Berkeley's proposed lead enforcement program indicating that the agenda item was moved to Agenda Committee on April 25, 2017 for budget analysis and for follow up on a presentation from the Healthy Homes Department for clarification on the roles and responsibilities. Berkeley City Council also passed unanimously the California Assembly Bill 1316, Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention introduced by Assemblyman Bill Quirk requiring universal blood lead testing. However, it received opposition from the medical community due to being unmanageable and too expensive. Director John J. Bauters stated he testified in Sacramento at the Appropriation Committee, which resulted in an amendment to AB 1316 to targeted screening adding that he also received opposition from medical groups. Director Gwen Hardy expressed frustration with the medical community stating they're making it harder to test children for lead.

Director Bauters indicated that the City of Emeryville's Renovation, Repair, and Painting (RRP) ordinance was adopted on April 18, 2017; Emeryville's ordinance matches U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's RRP rule in that it requires lead certification to conduct repairs and remodels in pre-1978 housing. Implementation of this ordinance is expected on May 1, 2018. Director Bauters indicated he would share the ordinance with the JPA Directors.

Mr. Brooks informed that on April 25, 2017, the Department staff met with PG&E representatives to learn of their Electric Tower Maintenance Program. The Program involves recoating 85 towers in Alameda County with new non-lead based paint beginning in the summer of 2017. A fact sheet was disseminated at the meeting.

Mr. Brooks stated the Department's Goals and Objectives will be presented for JPA Board approval on May 25, 2017.

3) Outreach and Education Monthly Report

Lidice De La Fuente provided highlights for the month of March noting that a total of 127,158 people were reached for the year; and, correcting the public outreach total count for the month of February 2017. Ms. De La Fuente highlighted the RRP training and a presentation on financing strategies for lead and healthy housing to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Program Manager's School in Indianapolis, Indiana by Housing Programs Director, Dale Hagen.

The meeting was called to order by John J. Bauters at 9:47 A.M.

2) Director's Report

Mr. Brooks informed of the East Bay Times article, *How Trump's cuts to EPA could hurt our kids*, and reminded Directors that President's cuts could impact the Department. Director Gwen Hardy who was interviewed for the article stated her words were misrepresented by the media and that lead continues to be a dangerous and silent killer, therefore, the elimination of these funds will affect children.

Mr. Brooks stated that the Department will not apply for the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) National Center for Environmental Health grant of up to \$35 million for three years due to the grant requiring the building of a lead screening database. As the California Department of Public Health already has a database the Department is not eligible. The grant funding would have provided for non-research activities to strengthen blood lead level testing, surveillance, population-based interventions, and processes to identify lead-exposed children and linkage to services. Mr. Brooks stated the Department continues to seek other sources of funding, however, many funding opportunities are diminishing.

Mr. Brooks stated that the Department staff is no longer looking to relocate to Hayward to reduce departmental costs. However, it will continue to look into other cost saving strategies.

Mr. Brooks announced that effective April 10, 2017, he is the Healthy Homes Department Director and will serve as the Secretary to the JPA Board. In addition, Ms. De La Fuente will continue to serve as Vice-Secretary on the JPA Board and Administrative Support Manager for the Department. Directors congratulated Mr. Brooks.

Mr. Brooks indicated that the Department's Budget FY 17/18 will be presented to the JPA Board on May 25, 2017.
