SUBJECT: ACCEPT AND APPROVE 2018 ZIP CODE PRIORITIES FOR EARLY CARE
AND EDUCATION FUNDING IN ALAMEDA COUNTY

Dear Board Members:

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- A. Accept and approve Zip Code Expansion Priorities for Early Care and Education Funding in Alameda County prepared by the Early Care and Education Planning Council and approved by its Executive Committee on May 8, 2018; and
- B. Authorize the President of the Board to sign the Local Planning Council (LPC) County Priorities Report Form CD-3022 Local Planning Council as required by the Early Education & Support Division of the California Department of Education.

DISCUSSION/SUMMARY:

State Education Code Section 8499.3 mandates that every county have a Local Child Care Planning Council (LPC) to “provide a forum for the identification of local priorities for child care and the development of policies to meet the needs identified within those policies.” The Early Education & Support Division (EESD) of the California Department of Education (CDE) published Management Bulletin 99-21 in November 1999. It states that any child care and/or preschool expansion funds through the Department must comply with Assembly Bill 1857, which requires that any new funds must go to the most underserved areas of California. In order for Alameda County to be considered for expansion funding (General Child Care or State Preschool), the Planning Council must identify the most underserved areas in our County by zip code.

In April 2003, the Early Education & Support Division published Management Bulletin 03-05, which further clarifies the process to establish priorities. It states, “The amended statute specifies that by May 30th of each year, upon approval by the County Board of Supervisors and the County Superintendent of Schools, each LPC shall submit to Childcare Development Division [now EESD] the local priorities it has identified that reflect all child care needs in the county.”



Using Fall 2017 data from the EESD, along with 2017 data from local Head Start Agencies and Stage 1 subcontractors, we compared the Total Supply (the number of preschool-aged children who are in subsidized care) against the Total Demand (census data on the number of families earning less than 70% of state median income) by age and zip code. We subtracted the Total Supply from the Total Demand to get the Unmet Need, which represents the estimated number of children who are underserved for subsidized preschool in each zip code.

Priority Three: All other zip codes in the County
