

**State Preschool Expansion Priorities for Alameda County, May 2003**  
**Prepared by the Alameda County Local Child Care Planning Council**

Below are 20 zip codes designated as **Alameda County's first priority for State Pre-school funding**. These zip codes were identified by comparing the number of children who were in subsidized care in 1997 against the current caseload of children on CalWORKs in each zip code. We have also included last year's state preschool expansion in this amount. The number of children already being subsidized in each zip code were subtracted from the number of CalWORKs children to arrive at an estimated number of children who may need care.

The remaining zip codes in our County are designated as second priority for State pre-school funding.

\* These numbers were taken from the 1997 Planning Council Needs Assessment -- they reflect the number of children pre-CalWORKs who are in subsidized care. 1999-2000 state preschool expansion grants are included above.

\*\* These numbers are from the Social Services Agency and are current as of Fall 1999.

\*\*\* Alameda will have an estimated increase of 200 eligible preschool age children through base conversion activities.

They will be housing homeless families and families who are victims of domestic violence.

The methodology used to develop these priorities summarizes the County's low-income and underserved neighborhoods including those with a high population of children and families receiving a CalWORKs subsidy.
